




## **CLUB PURPOSE**

## Offshore Lease Sale in Gulf Generates \$115 Million (8/19/2009)


NEW ORLEANS — A sale of federal oil and natural gas leases for the Western Gulf of Mexico attracted \$115,466,321 in high bids today, following yesterday's \$1.1 million sale of onshore energy leases in Utah, Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar announced. To date this year, the department has offered 55 million acres of U.S. public land – onshore and offshore – for oil and gas development, generating more than \$875 million in revenues.

"The responsible development of oil and gas resources on U.S. public lands is an integral part of President Obama's comprehensive energy strategy for the nation," Secretary Salazar said. "A domestic energy plan that balances the development of conventional and renewable energy resources – both onshore and offshore – is essential to reducing our country's dependence on foreign oil, building a clean-energy economy, and addressing the challenges of climate change."

Western Gulf of Mexico Oil and Gas Lease Sale 210, held in New Orleans by Interior's Minerals Management Service, received 189 bids on 162 federal Outer Continental Shelf tracts from 27 companies. The sum of all bids received totaled \$145,186,365.00. The highest bid received on a tract was \$28,133,843 for Keathley Canyon, Block 96 submitted by BP Exploration & Production Inc. The high bid for each block will go through a strict evaluation process to ensure the public receives fair market value before a lease is awarded.

Although \$115 million is not a small amount of money, the last March sale earlier this year generated \$690 million. This is significantly less revenue from many of the recent sales and hopefully not a trend of things to come for our industry.

# AMERICA'S FORGOTTEN WELLS

Easy question: The majority of our oil and gas supplies come from where? If you said major international companies you would be A large amount of oil and gas is produced from small independent companies, family-owned mom and pop operators, right here in the USA who operate stripper wells. These wells only produce 2 to 3 barrels of oil per day. Individually, stripper wells do not make an impact, but collectively they produce 30% of all the oil and 10% of the gas in the United States. There are over 400,000 stripper wells across the nation. To be classified as a stripper well, a well must produce less than 10 barrels of oil a day or less than 60,000 cubic feet of gas. These wells are called stripper wells because they squeeze, peel, or strip oil out of wells that have been abandoned or sold by the larger companies. These independents coax a declining well back to life. Many states with producing wells get 99% of their oil from stripper wells – states such as New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and more.

Only 1/3 of the oil is extracted from a well by the large companies. As a well gets older, the pressure is decreased, and the oil becomes harder to get out. Major companies do not want to be bothered with spending additional time and money to get less product, so they abandon the well or sell it off. As long as it is not plugged, it can be resuscitated and opened up again. Once plugged, however, the well is dead. It is just too expensive to open again. There are 2,000 to 2,500 plugged wells in the US today.

The oldest producing oil well, the McClintock #1 in Rouseville, Pennsylvania, is a stripper well. It has been in production since August of 1861. (Not a typo) It came in at 620 feet. It does not produce a large quantity, but it has had a small and continues to have, a steady production for over 100 years!

Aside from Alaska, 90% of the wells drilled in America are drilled by independent producers, people who are not affiliated with the major corporations. Your oil baron is not J.R. Ewing or anyone else with a recognizable name. It could well be your neighbor driving around in his pickup truck. Stripper well operators are a group of hard-working people with a shoestring budget, who work day in and day out to make sure the energy is flowing through the pipeline to the tanks and to the refinery. Independents provide an energy source to the nation, a very critical resource. It is important that this continue and that it continues at a higher technical level as time goes on.

Because stripper wells are small, they are much less noticeable than their larger counterparts. Most are in rural communities and they tend to blend right in with the environment and not be noticed. It is a fact that some communities could not exist were it not for the producing wells. It is symbiotic relationship. The farmers get royalties which help with their farming and some may even work part time at the well. In starting up a stripper in a rural location, the first thing is to build a road to the site. The independent will work with the land owner to see where the road needs to be laid out so that both parties benefit. Independents are as conscious of the environment as the larger companies. They have to abide by specific procedures and they undergo inspections by government officials just like the majors do.

There are still high reserves in the US, but it will take more technical advancements to extract these mature hydrocarbons. The independent can not get this oil out of the ground using 1920 and 1940 technology. There has to be something different for today's world. Thought and trials have been made using high pressure steam, injection of carbon dioxide or other exotic gases, and even water and soap. Fifty years ago reservoirs were easy to get to, but today reservoirs are harder to drill and need new technology. With the right technology, strippers can operate for years as the McClintock #1 is doing.

Independent operators are part of the solution. Stripper wells are the backbone of the industry. They can be equated to the SPR. Stripper operators produce 50% of the 12 Million barrels that the US needs.

America is dependent on oil and therefore we are vulnerable to a supply disruption. With most imports coming in through just a few ports, it would be easy for a supplier to cut us off for whatever the reason. However, with independents being scattered all over the US, they would be much more difficult to shut down.

We are spending dollars to import crude from people that do not support our communities, do not support our manufacturing, and do not pay taxes. In some cases, they may not even like us!

Independents are not going to run out and put their money in South America, Africa, Asia, or China. Their money goes into their own back yard, back to the community in which they work either directly with service companies or construction companies or indirectly with support to the local economy. Independents keep their wells producing and keep the local job market going. American companies, American wells, American labor.

Over the long term, achieving a truly substantinable energy system will require a broad range of every source known (nuclear, hydrogen gas, and wind) as well as more efficient technology. Still, the need for fossil fuels will continue into the foreseeable future making America's independent oil producer an important part of our energy solution. Oil is critical. It is essential. It is in everything we use.

# Nutritional Information by Theresa Adams

## What are Fat Soluble Vitamins?

Fat soluble vitamins are essential to your health, and each one has its one very important function in the body. Vitamins A, D, E and K are all classified as fat soluble vitamins - since they are soluble in fat and are absorbed by the body from the intestinal tract. They follow the same path of absorption as fat and any condition interfering with the absorption of fats would result in poor absorption of these vitamins as well.

This class of vitamin can be stored in the body to some extend, mostly in the liver, and because of this, short term deficiencies are less likely to manifest themselves.

**Vitamin A** or **Retinol and Carotene** can be obtained from either animal or vegetable sources. The animal form is divided between retinol and dehydroretinol whereas the vegetable carotene can be split into four very potent groups - alpha-carotene, beta-carotene, gamma-carotene and crypto-carotene. With enough beta-carotene available in the body, the body can manufacture its own vitamin A.

Vitamin A is required for night vision, and for a healthy skin. It assists the immune system, and because of its antioxidant properties is great to protect against pollution and cancer formation and other diseases. It also assists your sense of taste as well as helping the digestive and urinary tract and many believe that it helps slow aging.

**Vitamin D** or **Calciferol** can rightly be called the sunshine vitamin, since the body, in a sunny climate can manufacture this nutrient from sunshine on your skin using cholesterol from your body to do so. Please remember that this can be achieved in about 30 minutes by fair skinned people, while dark skinned people, because of the pigmentation need about 3 hours to reach the same level of manufacture. The sunlight needed for this process is pure unfiltered sunlight.

Vitamin D helps with increasing the absorption of calcium, assists in bone growth and the integrity of bone and promotes strong teeth. It also helps regulate the amount of phosphorus in the body as well as assisting in a healthy heart and nervous system. In some recent studies it has also shown great promise in assisting psoriasis, the immune system, thyroid function as well as normal blood clotting.

**Vitamin E** or **Tocopherol** has earned itself a reputation - from spicing up your sex life to banning wrinkles and old age. One of the most important functions of this vitamin is its antioxidant properties. Vitamin E is an essential fat-soluble vitamin that includes eight naturally occurring compounds in two classes designated as tocopherols and tocotrienols. Vitamin E is an effective chain-breaking, lipid-soluble antioxidant in biological membranes, and aids in membrane stability.

Vitamin E is a powerful antioxidant, protects your cells from oxidation, and neutralizes unstable free radicals, which can cause damage. This is done by the vitamin E giving up one of its electrons to the electron deficient free radical, making it more stable. While Vitamin E performs its antioxidant functions, it also protects the other antioxidants from being oxidized.

This antioxidant capability is then also great in helping to prevent degenerative diseases - including heart disease, strokes, arthritis, senility, diabetes and cancer. It also assists in fighting heart disease and cancers and is essential for red blood cells, helps with cellular respiration and protects the body from pollution - especially the lungs. Vitamin E is also useful in preventing blood clots from forming and promotes fertility, reduces and/or prevents hot flushes in menopause. An increase in stamina and endurance is also attributed to Vitamin E.

Vitamin E is also used topically to great effect for skin treatments - in helping the skin look younger, promoting healing and cutting down the risk of scar tissue forming. Used on the skin it is also reported to help with eczema, skin ulcers cold sores and shingles.

**Vitamin K** or **Phylloquinone and Menaquinone** can be produced in the intestines and this function is improved with the presence of cultured milk, like yogurt, in the diet.

Vitamin K is found in nature in two forms - K1, also called phylloquinone, is found in plants and vitamin K2, also called menaquinone, which can be synthesized by many bacteria. Vitamin K3, menadione, is a synthetic form of this vitamin which is manmade.

Vitamin K is used in the body to control blood clotting and is essential for synthesizing the liver protein that controls the clotting. It is involved in creating the important prothrombin, which is the precursor to thrombin - a very important factor in blood clotting. It is also involved in bone formation and repair. In the intestines it also assists in converting glucose to glycogen, this can then be stored in the liver. There are some indications that Vitamin K may decrease the incidence or severity of osteoporosis and slow bone loss.

# Why do the Vitamin names skip from E to K?

The reason the set of vitamins seems to skip directly from E to K is that the vitamins corresponding to "letters" F-J were either reclassified over time, discarded as false leads, or renamed because of their relationship to "vitamin B", which became a "complex" of vitamins. The German-speaking scientists who isolated and described vitamin K (in addition to naming it as such) did so because the vitamin is intimately involved in the *Koagulation* of blood following wounding. At the time, most (but not all) of the letters from F through to J were already designated, so the use of the letter K was considered quite reasonable.

The following table lists chemicals that had previously been classified as vitamins, as well as the earlier names of vitamins that later became part of the B-complex:


