Gaylen Guillory, club Vice President and alternate delegate, Susan Miller, 2020 and 2023 SE Region Director, and I attended the 72nd ADDC Convention and Educational Conference. The Central Region clubs and members hosted the convention at the Doubletree by Hilton Campbell Center in Dallas, Texas on September 24-29.

With 100 registered members and guests, the Southeast Region clubs worked together, under General Arrangements Chairman Val Williams, to provide educational and fun field trips, an energy symposium and industry speakers, and lots of opportunities to visit with old friends and make new ones. The four first-time attendees got a very intimate and impressive welcome to Convention! Following the luncheon, the ADDC Nominating Committee presented the 2025 Slate of Officers:

President-Elect: Evelyn Green; Secretary: Heather Woods; Treasurer: Christina Forth.

The Nominating Committee then conducted a candidates' caucus, during which the candidates had to tell us something about themselves we may not know. They all did a stellar job.

That afternoon, President Wendy Sparks conducted an Open Forum. Considering the five proposed amendments, it was surprisingly quiet. The closing of the Friday business session was a very touching memorial. We were free to enjoy the afternoon and get ready for the Ice Breaker that night.

We also had opportunities to get to know the candidates better at the Friday Night Ice Breaker. The evening was filled with live music, dancing, games, and prizes. Oh, and food – a Texas style brisket buffet!

The first order of business on Saturday was election of 2025 ADDC Officers. Since there was a single slate of candidates, they were elected by acclamation.

Following a break to take photos of our newly-elected board, we returned for the reports on 2025 and 2026 ADDC conventions. In 2025, we'll meet at Estancia del Norte San Antonio, in San Antonio, TX September 16-20, 2025; the link to book rooms will be available in January! The 2026 Convention, hosted by the Northeast Region, will be held in Canton, OH September 15-19.

The proposed amendments were presented and voted on as follows:

Amendment #1: Increase the ADDC dues from \$55/year to \$70/year – passed

Amendment #2: Change term of officers from one year to two years - failed

Amendment #3: Change terminology for Energy Technician – passed

Amendment #4: Change Convention from annual to biannual – failed

Amendment #5: Remove "in an extreme emergency" for region meetings – passed

An amendment was made on the floor to have the Board appoint an ad hoc committee to review the proposed regional restructuring, eliminating regional directors and replacing with club liaisons. The amendment passed. Therefore, the planned mail vote to implement the proposed amendment will not be held. The ad hoc committee has 45 days to present their findings and recommendations. If there is movement forward, it could be presented for vote at 2025 ADDC Convention. I'll keep you posted through year end.

Then the 2024 Region Directors gave their reports. Each RD highlighted the clubs and activities in their respective regions. The total ADDC membership currently stands at 642.

The next event was the Member Recognition Luncheon. Evelyn Green, 2021 ADDC President and 2025 ADDC President-Elect, was the keynote speaker.

The AIMEE Awards were presented by Contest Committee chairman Philana Thompson. Val Williams, 2004 ADDC President, received a very well-deserved Distinguished Service Award for her many accomplishments during her years of membership. 11/20/2024 - US Gulf Coast crude oil imports rise to over four-year high, EIA says - U.S. Gulf Coast commercial crude oil imports rose to 2 million barrels per day (bpd) last week, the highest since July 2020, data from the U.S. Energy Information Administration showed on Wednesday. The data, which excludes purchases made for the country's Strategic Petroleum Reserve, showed Gulf Coast crude oil imports rose by about 602,000 bpd from the prior week, the largest week-over-week increase since February. 11/20/2024 - Offshore Deepwater Drilling To Dominate Oil in 2020s - About a month ago, news emerged that Seadrill and Transocean, the offshore drilling heavyweights, were discussing a merger aimed at capitalizing on a rebound in investments in the business. Soon after, Portugal's Galp launched its second drilling campaign offshore Namibia after a huge discovery, and Suriname is about to become the second Guyana. Offshore is back—and it's back to stay. Earlier this month, Wood Mackenzie reported that offshore drilling was going to increase significantly in the coming years, with production from the deepwater sector alone facing a surge of 60% by 2030. Fellow forecaster Rystad Energy in 2023 saw investments in offshore oil and gas drilling at \$100 billion annually for 2023 and 2024. This year, it is expecting 2024 investments to reach \$104 billion. That's just the start of a boom. Read Full Article

11/19/2024 - Trump Picks Oil and Gas Executive as New Energy Secretary - President-elect Donald Trump announced that Chris Wright, the CEO and founder of Denver, Colorado-based Liberty Energy, will lead the Department of Energy (DOE) in the new administration. "I am thrilled to announce that Chris Wright will be joining my Administration as both United States Secretary of Energy, and Member of the newly formed Council of National Energy," Trump wrote in a statement released Nov. 16. The newly-elected president wrote that Wright "has been a leading technologist and entrepreneur in Energy." Wright, who founded oilfield services company Liberty Energy in 2011 and also serves as executive chairman of Liberty Resources, a company focused on the Bakken shale play in North Dakota, "has worked in Nuclear, Solar, Geothermal, and Oil and Gas," Trump's statement read. 11/19/2024 - America's Oil, Natural Gas Producers Outline Priorities to Trump Transition Team - Today the Independent Petroleum Association of America (IPAA) presented its issue priorities to the Trump Transition team. IPAA members are the primary producers of the nation's oil and natural gas, accounting for 83 percent of America's oil production and 90 percent of its natural gas output. The IPAA memo details priorities including equitable tax policies for energy businesses, sensible environmental regulations, reform of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA)/permitting reform, access to federal lands and waters, reforms to the Endangered Species Act, and lifting the pause on issuing permits for liquefied natural gas (LNG) export facilities. 11/12/2024 - Talos begins drilling Gulf of Mexico well with plans for more in 2025 - Katmai West spuds thanks to Seadrill vessel, and Daenerys and Helm's Deep are scheduled for future drilling. Talos Energy has begun drilling a second well at its Katmai West field in the US Gulf of Mexico and is hoping the well will produce by mid-2025, the Houston-based operator said. Read Full Article

API Releases New Policy Roadmap for Incoming Administration and Next Congress to Secure American Energy Leadership and Help Reduce Inflation

WASHINGTON, November 12, 2024 – The American Petroleum Institute (API) today released a new policy roadmap for the incoming Trump administration and next Congress to secure American energy leadership and help reduce inflation. Beginning with an open letter to President-elect Trump, the <u>5-point policy roadmap</u> details concrete steps Washington can take in 2025 and beyond to protect consumers, bolster geopolitical strength, leverage our national resources, reform our permitting system and advance sensible tax policy.

"Our country has a generational opportunity to fully leverage U.S. energy leadership to improve the lives of all Americans and bring stability to a volatile world," API President and CEO Mike Sommers wrote in the letter to President-elect Trump. "It has never been more vital that America control its energy future."

"Yet our continued success is far from guaranteed, and we have been heading down a path of extreme regulations threatening everything from our choice of home appliances to the cars we drive," Sommers said. "As an industry committed to American prosperity, we stand ready to work with you and Congress to reverse course and advance a robust vision for securing America's energy dominance."

API's 5-point policy roadmap outlines the path forward, including:

Protect consumer choice

- Repeal the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) tailpipe rules.
- Repeal the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's Corporate Average Fuel Economy (CAFE) standards.
- Deny/Rescind EPA's Waiver for California's Advanced Clean Cars II (ACCII) rule.

Bolster America's geopolitical strength

- Lift the Department of Energy's (DOE) LNG permitting pause.
- Swiftly process all pending export applications now languishing at DOE.
- Ensure the open access of American energy to global markets.

Leverage our natural resources

- Issue a new Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) five-year offshore leasing program.
- Repeal restrictive onshore leasing rules, starting with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Conservation and Landscape Health Rule.
- End EPA's methane fee that misinterprets Congressional intent and does little beyond increasing the cost of production for American oil and natural gas.

Reform our permitting system

- Reform the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA).
- Reform the Clean Water Act.
- Advance judicial reform.
- Repeal the Biden-era NEPA rules.

Advance sensible tax policy

- Retain the 21% corporate tax rate to ensure global competitiveness.
- Maintain and extend tax provisions for domestic infrastructure investment.
- Preserve crucial international tax provisions.

API represents all segments of America's natural gas and oil industry, which supports nearly 11 million U.S. jobs and is backed by a growing grassroots movement of millions of Americans. Our approximately 600 members produce, process and distribute the majority of the nation's energy, and participate in <u>API Energy Excellence®</u>, which is accelerating environmental and safety progress by fostering new technologies and transparent reporting. API was formed in 1919 as a standards-setting organization and has developed more than 800 standards to enhance operational and environmental safety, efficiency and sustainability.

Non-renewable Fuel: Nuclear Fuel

Nuclear fuel—Uranium-235, found in certain rock formations, is mined for use as the fissile material in slow-reaction nuclear power generation. Rare in its natural state, uranium-235 is a nonrenewable resource, although small quantities go a long way. For example, the fission of one pound of uranium releases more energy than burning three million pounds of coal.

Nuclear fission reactors split atoms to release the energy from the nucleus of enriched uranium. In this process, the fuel is placed in rods in the reactor core, and a chain reaction is started by bombarding the fuel with slow neutrons. Heat from the chain reaction is absorbed by the water in the reactor. The water then turns into steam, which, in turn, drives a turbine and a generator to produce electricity. Control rods—made of cadmium or boron—are introduced to slow down or stop the chain reaction.

In fast-reaction nuclear power generation (breeder reactors), high-velocity neutrons cause the fissions, using plutonium or uranium-233. Breeder reactors produce more fuel (enriched uranium and plutonium) than they consume. Thus, fast-reaction nuclear power fuel is considered renewable and sustainable. Nuclear power plants do not release carbon dioxide (a contributor to global climate change) or sulfur dioxide (a contributor to acid rain).

One obstacle to nuclear fission power is that radioactive nuclear waste is generated. High-level radioactive waste—the fission products in the used fuel rods—will be dangerous for the next 100 to 1,000 years. There is no known way to speed the removal of radioactivity from waste. Spent fuel rods are first cooled in large tanks, then encapsulated in ceramic or glass containers. These containers are then placed in stainless steel containers and stored. Very little high-level waste is made by a reactor in a year—enough to occupy a volume of about half a cubic yard.

Powering a Manufacturing Renaissance

U.S. oil and gas companies are using innovative production techniques to unlock natural gas trapped deep below the surface in shale rock. This new, abundant supply of domestic natural gas is helping usher in an American manufacturing renaissance.



Manufacturing & Natural Gas

Natural gas is critical to our manufacturers. For example, the chemical industry uses natural gas as a building block to create plastics and synthetic fibers. And the steel industry relies on natural gas to heat and power mills.

With an abundant, affordable supply of natural gas, U.S manufacturers can reduce the cost of production, giving them a competitive advantage on the world market. The result is increased exports and new jobs.

Fruit Cake Cookies



Prep Time	Total	Servings	Ingredients
35 min	2 HR O MIN	36	15

Ingredients

- 3/4 cup golden raisins
- 1/2 cup chopped dates
- 1/2 cup brandy
 - box Betty Crocker™ Super Moist™ Yellow Cake Mix
- 1/2 cup packed brown sugar
 - 1 tablespoon grated orange zest
 - 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 cup butter, melted
 - 1 egg
 - 2 tablespoons water
- 3/4 cup coarsely chopped maraschino cherries, drained, patted dry
- 1/2 cup coarsely chopped toasted slivered almonds
- 1/2 cup chopped candied green cherries, if desired

Instructions

- 1 Heat oven to 350°F.
- 2 In 1-quart saucepan, heat raisins, dates and brandy to simmering over medium heat. Remove from heat; let stand 15 minutes. Drain; set aside. Discard liquid.
- 3 Meanwhile, in large bowl, stir together cake mix, brown sugar, orange zest, cinnamon, ginger and nutmeg. In small bowl, stir melted butter, egg and water until blended. Add butter mixture to cake mix-brown sugar mixture; beat with spoon until well blended. Add drained fruit, maraschino cherries, nuts and candied cherries.
- 4 Drop dough by rounded tablespoonfuls 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie
- 5 Bake 11 to 13 minutes or until edges are set. Cool on cookie sheet 2 minutes; remove from cookie sheet to cooling rack. Cool completely, about 30 minutes. Store covered in airtight container.


